February 11th Sawdust Session Paul Percell "Close Fitted Lidded Box"

This is the first of several post-meeting sessions we are planning for the year. If you are interested in learning to turn a fitted lid box, plan of staying for a two and a half hour class with Paul Percell. Experienced teaching assistants will be there to also help. You will need to bring your own tools, safety gear and chuck for a 1x8 headstock thread.

The session will be limited to 12 participants and five mentors. A piece of maple 2.5 x 5" will be supplied. The costs of sawdust session will be \$13.00 per person. Participants should bring own tools and chuck (1"x 8 tpi). Tools -roughing gouge, 3/8 spindle gouge with fingernail grind, 1/16" parting tool. small 1/2"scaper can be straight or small curve for the bottom of box. Participants should be at the intermediate level for their own comfort.

If you're having a turning problem, bring the piece in to share. Got tearout, we can discuss! Having sharpening problems, bring in your tools for suggestions or hands-on help at the grinder. Finishing issues well, you get it. It's an open forum so anything goes. We'll gather around the Oneway demo lathe at 1:00 pm and see what happens.

If you want to see a particular skill demonstrated, we can mount a piece of wood and fire up the Oneway. January Presentation Summary

At the first meeting of our new year Jim Rodgers, President, led the assembly in a series of group discussions on techniques that we use to improve the quality of our cutting and finishing on various wood surfaces. Members were seated at round table to increase the member to member communications.

Issues addressed were tear out, crushed grain, surface preparation for top coating, etc.

Each topic was discussed among small groups and then shared with the entire meeting.

Here are a few key points for getting good cuts:

- Keep the tools sharp

- Reduce the tool size for final cuts

- Shorten the bevel length for final cuts

- If available, reverse the rotation of the lathe to reduce tear out

- Stiffen the wood fibers before the final cut when tear out exists

- Also try lubricating the wood with oil finishes before the final cuts (Opposite technique!)

Also discussed was perfecting the final surface:

- Try cabinet scrapers for a shear scrape

- When sanding

 - Use the best quality sand paper available

 - Always sand with the grain direction with each grit

 - Never skip a grit of sandpaper

- Try random orbital sanding

 - With power sanding or inertial sanders

 - Be sure to use a hard backing pad when sanding soft woods

 - Always use some backing pad to protect the Velcro® hooks from melting



2012 AAW Symposium News

AAW Symposium Committees

Several members signed-up as *Demonstrator Room Assistants* at the January meeting, and more responded to the mass e-mail afterwards. It's still not too late to volunteer, just follow the mass e-mail instructions by sending a request to John Ellis with a copy to Bill Mellberg, who's the local chair. BAWA has several other members that are chairing committees, whom I recognized at the January meeting. I'd like to take this opportunity to provide more information on these committees, as they will be soliciting volunteers over the next few months.

Equipment Committee: Jim Abreu is co-chairing this committee with Rich Johnson of the Silicon Valley Woodturners and John Ross of the West Bay Area Woodturners. This committee arranges for and manages all the equipment and supplies needed for the demonstrations. Lathes for the demonstration rooms are loaned by the major lathe manufacturers, which are sold afterwards. The AAW and the demonstrators provide some of the equipment needed, but everything else that's needed is borrowed from AAW members. As the symposium draws closer Jim may be asking for equipment to be loaned, so please consider filling his requests. Anything loaned is guaranteed to be returned or replaced. Jim will also be looking for volunteers to work on Thursday (set-up day) to bring all the equipment and supplies into the convention center (except the lathes!) and set up the tool room. During the symposium the tool room is staffed to move things to and from the demonstration rooms, and to pack-up and move out after the symposium ends. In all this committee needs 16 volunteers from the 3 clubs.

Grinder Set-up and Tear-down Committee: Hugh Buttrum heads up this committee which sets-up grinders in the demonstration rooms, and then tears them down and packs them for shipment. Hugh's really doing this for his "home" club, the Wine Country Woodturners, but his second home is BAWA so we need to support him if he asks for help. In all Hugh needs 5 volunteers on Thursday, and then again on late Sunday afternoon.

Instant Gallery EOG Auction: Jim Rodgers is chairing this committee which supports the Educational Opportunity Grant (EOG) Auction late Saturday afternoon and evening. The EOG Auction starts in the Instant Galley with 200 turnings in a silent auction, but the 65 pieces with the highest bids move to a live auction at the banquet Saturday night. Jim will need 8 to 10 volunteers to pack up these 65 turnings on Saturday afternoon, move them to the banquet room, set them up for the live auction and then re-pack them after they're sold. Volunteers will be handling work from some of the best turners in the world, so klutzes need not apply!

International Demonstrator Greeting Committee: Norm Robinson chairs this committee which is responsible for picking up the international demonstrators at the airport and driving them to their convention center hotel; then taking them back to the airport after the symposium. Norm will need 6 to 10 volunteers from the 3 Bay Area clubs.

Registration Committee: Jeff and Demi Tanner are co-chairing this committee, which will help AAW staff with registration on Thursday afternoon and Friday morning. Jeff and Demi will be looking for 6 to 8 volunteers to work the registration table, basically handing out regis-

tration packets to the attendees. AAW staffers take over at noon on Friday, freeing up all the volunteers to enjoy the rest of the symposium.

Wood and Materials Committee: Bob Nolan co-chairs this committee with John Whittier of the Silicon Valley Woodturners and Laura Uden of the West Bay Area Woodturners. This committee provides and prepares turning stock for the International Demonstrators and for the Youth Turning Room. They may ask for help in locating and cutting wood, or for specific turning stock that they can't locate. Please consider helping them if they ask for assistance.

Youth Training Aids: Corwin Jones is co-chairing this committee with John Whittier of the Silicon Valley Woodturners. This committee is responsible for providing training aids (assistants) in the Youth Turning Room, where 25 mini-lathes are set up to teach kids to turn over a total of 9 rotations. If you like working with kids this is a great opportunity, and there's no preparation work on your part. But, this is one of the bigger committees needing to fill 120 slots! Members from across the US volunteer, but we will need many local volunteers and BAWA may need to fill gaps during the symposium. Corwin's another "BAWA second homer" so he's doing this for his "home" club, the NorCal Woodturners, but we need to support him when

BAWA Helps Castro Valley High School

No More Mezzanine Mess!

With the students starting woodworking projects in the new year, the mezzanine area of the woodshop needed some work, organizing and a general cleaning. A small BAWA crew spent 2 to 3 hours in the mezzanine which made a huge difference; by early afternoon the entire area was ready for the students to start gluing up their first project, cutting boards.

Many thanks to the BAWA members who volunteered



their time and labor on Saturday January 14th, including Bob Ackley, Dean Adkins, Hugh

Bevan-Thomas, Corwin Jones, Dave Nelsen, Wayne Shipman, Demi and Jeff Tanner, Jerry Theros, Dan Titzel and Don White.



All together the BAWA members volunteered 24 hours of labor to the wood shop, but more importantly got this area ready for the students to go to work on Monday morning. The lumber storage rack area was straightened up and a huge stack of new lumber was sorted by species and stowed away. The glue up area was a real mess – it got a general cleaning and all the wood clamps were sorted and stowed away. The remaining small bore black iron piping and valving was demolished and removed, freeing up wall space for a storage shelf to be installed. Bob Ackley and Corwin Jones built and installed 3 shelves for glue storage.

The horizontal wood storage racks were straightened up, creating room for the students to store glue-ups between classes. The downstairs sheet goods storage area was organized, with the smaller pieces of plywood and veneers moved to a separate storage area. Finally the lathe room got a bit of cleaning and TLC.

As part of the CVHS-BAWA adoption program we buy supplies and tools for the woodshop. BAWA found a really great deal on 4 Sorby woodturning tool sets, which each included 6 tools: a 3/4" roughing gouge, a 3/8" spindle gouge, a 1/8" parting tool, a 1/2" round nose scraper, a 3/4" oval skew and a 3/8" bowl gouge. Each set was only \$100 which was a great deal! We also bought 6 rubber erasers to clean sanding discs and belts. An unknown member donated 2 quart bottle of Titebond glue. Finally, last November the club bought 8 flexible neck LED lights for the lathe room, which Norm Robinson and Dean Adkins mounted on magnetic bases and delivered and spotted on the lathes after the meeting.



If you couldn't volunteer for this work party, please try to make the next one. Also, the club is looking at other ways for members to contribute to the CVHS-BAWA wood shop relationship, which could include labor, expertise or donations of equipment or materials. A sandpaper drive is in the works for the spring. The Board would welcome any suggestions – simply send them to Dean Adkins at adkd@chevron.com.



If Wood Could Grow Legs???

The wood raffle has been an important fundraiser for BAWA for many years. Last year it raised \$832 in revenue; in 2010 it raised \$577, and \$306 and \$537 in 2009 and 2008 respectively. The wood raffle works only if members who are afflicted with “wood hog” disease donate wood to the raffle, as well as members who need wood and are willing to buy tickets. I’ve cut and donated quite a bit of wood over the last 4 years trying to keep the raffle going, and many members have contributed wood on a consistent basis. It takes an involved Wood Meister to convince members to donate wood, sell tickets during the meeting and run the wood raffle. No one gets paid for their efforts; they do it to give back to the club, for its members, and the friendship and camaraderie that BAWA offers.



But there might be a problem. Members who bought tickets to try and snag some redwood burl and some spindle blanks of pecan were disappointed because the wood disappeared. We do not know how it happened or when it happened but we will try to be more vigilant so it does not happen again. BAWA is the only club that I know of that doesn't charge its members for the professional demonstrations and the wood raffle helps make that possible.
